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## Shark patrols for coastline

Premier Colin Barnett made the announcement this week following three fatal shark attacks off Perth and the South West in the past two months.

Mr Barnett said patrols would begin as soon as a helicopter contract could be secured.

"To have had three fatal shark attacks in just the last few weeks is an teers and City of Bunbury Mayor unprecedented situation and it does call for urgent action," he said.

The State Government has pledged an additional \$1 million in funding for aerial patrols of major WA beaches.

There will also be expanded life-West, including Busselton, from mers.

The extra services will operate seven days a week until the end of January next year, but patrols in Bunbury will remain limited to the week-

Earlier this month, Bunbury city councillor Ross Slater called for a 1500m shark net to be built off the reduced the risk of shark attacks on guard services in parts of the South city's Back Beach to protect swim-

Dolphin Discovery Centre general

AERIAL shark patrols will operate November 21, to coincide with manager David Kerr described shark nets as "indiscriminate" and said marine species other than sharks would get caught in them.

> ''We'd certainly be concerned about the potential for them (shark nets) trapping any of our local dolphins," he said.

> Mr Kerr said staff had never seen a shark in 10 years of conducting dolphin tours.

> University of Western Australia marine neuroecologist Ryan Kempster condemned the call for a shark net and threw his support behind the use of aerial patrols.

> He described shark nets as "a poor use of taxpayers' money' as there was no evidence to suggest they actually beach-goers.
